




We suggest you select sessions that will help you decide between subjects you have been considering or select sessions you do not know much about. You might discover an exciting course you had not previously considered!






- **Select 4 sessions** that suit your interests and **2 reserve sessions** (numbers 5 and 6), just in case we are unable to allocate one of your first 4 choices





Remember, the sessions you choose on Taster Day are **not** your subjects for 2027, so you are not locked into any specific subjects for next year.



This will suit you, if:

You have an interest in working with animals, would like to access further study, and enjoy working outdoors.

Overview:

This qualification provides knowledge and skills for work in the animal care and management industry. It could lead to further study or employment in an animal care role.

In this industry, workers provide care for animals in workplaces such as:

- animal shelters
- boarding/day care facilities
- sanctuaries
- pet shops.

The work activities are routine, performed under supervision and within clearly defined guidelines.

You may learn:

- how to provide appropriate food, water and shelter for a variety of animals
- how to complete a variety of animal care hygiene routines and assist in animal health care procedures
- animal rescue first aid
- how to stay safe and healthy in the workplace
- the skills employers value in the workplace.

In typical lessons you might:

- feed, water and provide care for a range of animals
- visit an animal park, veterinary clinic or RSPCA
- learn about products and services in animal care
- investigate some of the career paths in animal care
- gather information about caring for domestic pets.

You have an interest in farming and agriculture, you're interested in further study, and you'd like to work outdoors.

Overview:

This qualification provides a general introduction to the agriculture industry. It outlines the skills and knowledge required for general jobs in rural and regional Australia. It could lead to further study or supporting job roles in agriculture including livestock production and cropping. With this qualification you may be able to carry out job roles such as:

- Assistant animal attendant/stockperson
- Assistant farm or station hand
- Assistant farm or station worker
- Assistant farm or station labourer
- Farm machinery worker
- Jillaroo/Jackaroo
- Saleyard livestock worker.

You may learn:

- basic skills in your interest area of farming. These might include dairy, beef, wool, sheep, cropping or mixed farming
- how a farm operates
- how to stay safe and healthy in the workplace
- how to participate in environmentally sustainable work practices
- the skills employers value in young workers.

In typical lessons you might:

- learn how to use farming equipment
- learn how to prepare and exhibit an animal for an agricultural show
- visit a farm
- take part in an agricultural show.

With this qualification, you will be able to carry out routine tasks under supervision.

You may learn:

- skills and knowledge needed to work in horticulture; this might include a retail or wholesale nursery, landscaping, parks and gardens, arboriculture, or general horticulture
- how to care for the environment and work sustainably
- how to stay safe and healthy in the workplace
- the skills employers value in young workers.

In typical lessons you might:

- be shown how to recognise certain plants
- design or create a garden
- learn how to grow plants
- assist with soil or growing media sampling and testing
- learn about the nutritional and economic use of plants
- find out how to treat plant pests and diseases.
